# Sharing Stories with Aboriginal Elder and Author

On Tuesday 3 August, a group of John Paul II Grade 1 and Grade 2 students were invited to celebrate National Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Children's Day, with children from two other schools

During the special event at the Catholic Education Office, they listened to, and interacted with highly regarded Elder, author, researcher and cultural historian, Aunty Patsy Cameron as she read her recently published book Sea Country. Students curiosity was sparked as they heard of stories and traditions from Aunty Patsy's family seasonal life on Flinders Island. They enjoyed looking at and handling items discussed and illustrated in the text, such as seeds, plants, flowers, fruits and shells, including a shell necklace, and found out when and how they are collected.

The group also enthusiastically participated as Education Officer, Sarah-Jane Moore read her newly published children's book River Business.

Students agreed that Sea Country and River Business are special stories with beautiful illustrations, and that they really enjoyed gaining more understanding of their culture.

Recently I worked with the Grade 3 and Grade 6 students with the 'Make Jesus Real Program' at your child's wonderful school at John Paul II.



### How much is enough sleep?

Recently, Legal Aid Tasmania visited the Grade 4, 5 and 6 classes to talk about cyber safety and what it means to be safe online. All classes engaged positively and respectfully throughout the sessions which was pleasing to see. An important function that can be impacted by our use of technology is sleep.

- Sleep is important for growth, immunity, learning and memory.
- Babies, children and teenagers need different amounts of sleep.
- Sleep patterns change as babies and children get older.

Our school counsellors are available throughout the school year to assist you and your family by contacting the office.

Recommendations for amount of sleep required by children

- **Newborns** sleep on and off for 14-17 hours every 24 hours.
- Babies (3-6 mths) usually sleep for 12-15 hours every 24 hours.
- Toddlers need 11-14 hours of sleep every 24 hours.
- Children aged 3-5 years need 10-13 hours of sleep a night.
- Children aged 5-11 years need 9-11 hours of sleep a night.
- Teenagers generally need about 8-10 hours of sleep a night
